How is God's Word a "proceeding word"?

- God's Word is a proceeding word. **Proceed** means "to come from a source; to go on in an orderly regulated way, to carry on an action, process, or movement; to advance with a series of events, actions, or happenings".
- God's Word is an authoritative series of actions and creative declarations. It is designed with divine and predestined purpose to prosper in every area of our lives, both naturally and spiritually, to the glory of God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.
- As per the definition, in order for something to "proceed", it must continue from a point of origin or source. God is our source. If God starts it, He will finish it. He is obligated to do so by His own word and authority.
 - **Philippians 1:6 (KJV)** – *Being confident of this very thing, that he which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ:*
 - **Revelation 21:6 (KJV)** – *And he said unto me, It is done. I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end. I will give unto him that is athirst of the fountain of the water of life freely.*
- The opposite is also true. If God doesn't start it, He will not finish it. Don't expect God to finish what He didn't start. God doesn't start foolishness, envy, strife, bitterness or confusion; so don't expect God to finish or perfect it. He doesn't bless mess, but He will cleanse it with His Blood if you give it to Him.
- There are many interruptions and pauses that come on this journey of life. This may be the enemy, family, friends, associates, or just daily life situations. Though they may cause us to pause, they cannot stop the process God has started! God's Word never stops or delays. God's Word never fails.

Excerpts from Bible Overview by Rose Publishing: Isaiah (pgs. 105 – 109)

• Purpose:

- Called to prophesy to the kingdom of Judah, the prophet Isaiah preached a message of judgment and salvation.
- The main purpose of the book of Isaiah is to communicate God's anger, disappointment, and sorrow with His people's behavior and to warn them of impending judgment. Judah could continue to turn to political treaties, other gods, and military strength to save them, but their efforts to do so would prove worthless. Unless the people of Judah repented and fully relied on God as their Savior, they would never be safe from destruction.
- However, Isaiah is more than a prophecy of doom. Isaiah, whose name means "Yahweh saves," wrote beautiful and memorable prophecies of hope and salvation. Isaiah's prophecy anticipates the coming of a king, a Messiah, who will fulfill all of God's promises to Israel. A remnant of God's people will find their redemption in the coming of this Messiah – a suffering servant – who will die to save them.
- During his long ministry, Isaiah warned the kings of Judah about their political and military deals as well as their unrighteousness, complacency, injustices, and arrogance.

• Themes:

- **God the Holy One of Israel.** God is a holy God, and He will not tolerate sin. Sin will be punished.
- **God as Savior and Redeemer.** God is a merciful, loving and forgiving God. Israel and Judah deserved to be completely destroyed, but God promised salvation and restoration to a remnant.
- **God's Suffering Servant – The Promised Messiah.** Only through the suffering of the promised Messiah, God's Servant, will God's people be healed and forgiven of their iniquities. The promised Messiah, through His suffering, will inaugurate the kingdom of God – the new heaven and the new earth.

• Jesus in Isaiah

- Jesus is the promised Messiah, a descendant of King David (Isa. 11:1-2). Jesus Christ fulfilled more than 50 prophecies in the book of Isaiah.
- Jesus is the suffering servant who was pierced for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities, and by His wounds we are healed (Isa. 53; I Peter 2:21-25).
- Death would not contain Jesus. In His death and resurrection, Jesus inaugurated a new kingdom – God's kingdom. When Jesus returns, there will be a new heaven and a new earth where crying and weeping will be heard no more (Isa. 65:17-19).

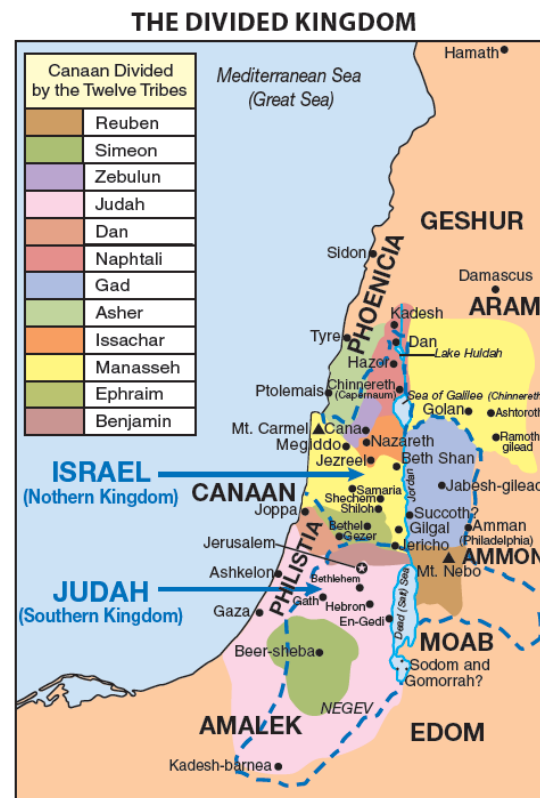


Figure 1- The Divided Kingdom

According to the MacArthur Study Bible Commentary:

- **Isaiah 55:1**
 - **Everyone.** The Servant's redemptive work and glorious kingdom is for the benefit of all who are willing to come (53:6). The prophet invites his readers to participate in the benefits obtained by the suffering of the Servant in chapter 53 and described in chapter 54.
 - **no money ... without money and without price.** Benefits in the Servant's kingdom will be free because of His redemptive work (53:6, 8, 11; Eph. 2:8, 9).
 - **Wine and milk.** Symbols for abundance, satisfaction, and prosperity (Song 5:1; Joel 3:18).
- **Isaiah 55:2 not bread.** This is the "bread of deceit" (Prov. 20:17) and not the "bread of life" (John 6:32-35).
- **Isaiah 55:3**
 - **Everlasting covenant.** The new Covenant that God will give to Israel (54:8; 61:8; Jer. 31:31-34; 32:40; 50:5; Ezek. 16:60, 37:26; Heb. 13:20).
 - **Sure mercies of David.** The Davidic Covenant promised David that his seed would be ruler over Israel in an everlasting kingdom (2 Sam. 7:8, 16; Ps. 89:27-29). Paul connected the resurrection of Christ with this promise (Acts 13:34), since it was an essential event in fulfilling this promise. If He had not fully satisfied God by His atoning death, He would not have risen; if He had not risen from the dead, He could not eventually sit on David's earthly throne. But He did rise and will fulfill the kingly role (v.4). Cross reference Jer. 30:9; Ezek. 34:23,24; 37:24,25; Dan. 9:25; Hos. 3:5; Mic. 5:2. The whole world will come to Him as the Great King (v.5).
- **Isaiah 55:6, 7** Here is one of the clearest OT invitations to salvation now and kingdom blessing later. It gives an excellent example of how people were saved during the OT period. Salvation grace and mercy were available to the soul that was willing to 1) seek the Lord (Deut. 4:29; 2 Chr. 15:4) and 2) call on Him while He is still available (65:1; Ps. 32:6; Prov. 8:17; Matt. 25:1-13; John 7:34; 8:21; 2 Cor. 6:2; Heb. 2:3; 3:13,15). Such true seeking in faith is accompanied by repentance, which is described as forsaking ways and thoughts and turning from sinful living to the Lord. A sinner must come, believing in God, recognizing his sin and desiring forgiveness and deliverance from that sin. At the same time he must recognize his own inability to be righteous or to satisfy God and cast himself on God's mercy. It is then that he receives a complete pardon. His sin has been covered by the substitution of the Messiah in his place (chap. 53). This OT pattern of salvation is illustrated in Luke 18:9-14.
- **Isaiah 55:7 forsake.** An integral part of seeking the Lord (v. 6) is a turning from sin (1:16).
- **Isaiah 55:8, 9 My thoughts ... My ways.** Some may doubt such willingness as described in v.7, but God's grace is far beyond human comprehension, especially as manifested toward Israel.
- **Isaiah 55:10, 11 rain ... snow ... My word.** Moisture from heaven invariably accomplishes its intended purpose in helping meet human physical needs. The Word of God will likewise produce its intended results in fulfilling God's spiritual purposes, especially the establishment of the Davidic kingdom on earth (vv. 1- 5).
- **Isaiah 55:12 go out with joy ... led out with peace.** Exiled Israel will return from her dispersion rejoicing in her deliverance and unbothered by her enemies.
- **Isaiah 55:13 Instead of the thorn ... myrtle tree.** In the Davidic kingdom positive changes in nature, including the reverse of the curse (Gen. 3:17) will be an ongoing testimony to the Lord's redemption of His people (44:23; Rom. 8:19-23).
